Workshop 1: Ceramics Hand-Building Workshop with Holly O'Meehan (For Artists)

In this beginner's clay workshop, you will learn how to transfer your drawings onto slabs of clay by using the traditional technique of sgraffito. We will experiment by using different coloured clays combined with black and white underglaze to develop a variety of flat artworks that could be displayed as wall or floor plaques, or even personalised shapes and designs that can be worked on further with other hand crafting techniques.

*Participants are required to wear enclosed shoes.

About Holly O'Meehan

Holly O'Meehan is an emerging West Australian artist whose practice focuses on combining ceramics with textiles. Graduating from Curtin University in 2014 with a Bachelor Double Degree in Fine Art & Art and Design, she has since exhibited work in various galleries in Perth and Albany. She also collaborates with Jill O'Meehan under the name of Golden Wattle Hookers creating public installations made solely from crochet. Her work can be found in various boutiques around WA.

Workshop 2: Silk-Dying Workshop with Roberta Leary (For Artists)

In this workshop students will learn the easy technique of cold water shibori dyeing using PROCION dyes on natural fabrics. This is a traditional Japanese technique which involves either folding, pleating, clamping, binding, or pole wrapping fabric before it is dyed in a cold water dye bath. Each technique produces a different type of pattern and colours are vibrant and colourfast. Each student will be supplied with 3 objects to dye different colours:

- Cotton short sleeve t-shirt
- Shopping / tote bag
- Cotton standard pillowcase

All students work will be clearly marked with permanent marker and washed and ironed before collection on Saturday (Revealed Market Day).

Workshop 4: Photography & Social Media Workshop with Cole Baxter (For Art Centre Managers)

In this workshop, Cole will briefly discuss his photography art practice, as well provide practical skills and knowledge that you can take back to your art centre. Using professional studio equipment and accessible tools, you will learn how to; document and archive art (predominantly 2D), see photo editorial storytelling basics and receive social media marketing tips.

Cole Baxter is a Noongar photographer based in Walyalup/Fremantle W.A. Some recent noted works of Cole's include being selected as the 2023 Melville Art Awards overall winner, co-creating 2023 exhibition 'You're (Not) Wanjoo' as part of Fremantle's '10 Nights in Port' festival and principal photography for the book 'Ngaluk Waangkiny', a landmark multi-media storytelling project honouring the Noongar elders on the City of Perth council.
